#### <u>Minutes</u>

A motion to waive the reading of the minutes from the January meeting was made by Bob McDermott and seconded by Chuck. All in favor.

#### **Treasurers** Report

Brian was called in to work due to the weather and had to cancel shortly before the meeting, thus, the February treasurers' report was tabled.

#### Old Business

- Joe, in Paul's absence, updated the group on the upcoming chapter Go-Kart event. (www.stockys.us)

The date is Sunday, March 21<sup>st</sup> and we'll "start our engines" at 11AM with three races per person, 15-20 laps each. We'll have the track to ourselves for an hour before they open to the public at 12PM. A pizza buffet will follow, with garlic bread (possibly salad - "still negotiating" that one) and unlimited soda. \$5 pitchers of beer will also be available.

Paul has put together a flier/registration form (attached) for the event and asks everyone that is interested in attending to fill one out and mail it in to him, ASAP, along with your money.

The following questions were raised:

Q: Are spectators allowed? If so, is there a "pizza buffet only" price? A: Yes - \$5.95

Q: Are children allowed? A: Yes - Must be 54" tall to ride alone. Stocky's has one "double seated kart" so if someone has a child smaller than 54" they can utilize that kart.

- Kim reported on the status of the Sweetheart Dance and, with just days to go, all things seem to be in order. A quick tally showed about 70 tickets sold so far from the information she's received to date.

With most of the "i's" dotted and "t's" crossed, this session was mostly a brainstorming and loose ends sort of discussion. What few questions remain, such as where the door prize table and booze raffle table will be located will be determined during set up on Saturday.

Jim Klisch from Lakefront Brewery will be delivering two (donated) barrels of beer (a half-bbl and a quarter-bbl) and he will take care of setting them up for us as well. Chuck asked if we need members to dispense the beer or if the attendees would be serving themselves. He was concerned because of the excessive waste of beer he noticed at our International Convention when guests served their own beer. Kim was not sure if the donated beer would be behind the bar (where hall staff would be serving it) or if it would be out in the public area. If the latter is correct, we can assign members on a rotating basis to monitor if necessary. Ted & Pat have already volunteered to do just that and, no doubt, they'll probably have to arm wrestle Chuck just to get close to the tappers!

As the 2011 event grows closer and the dates are announced, Steve will renew the suggestion and we'll decide if there is enough interest/commitment to pursue the idea.

#### WI State Convention

Are you making plans for the summer yet? Maybe the International Convention in Billings, MT is a bit too far for you to travel this year but you still want to get away and ride for a weekend. How about checking out our very own WI State Convention, hosted by WI VIII in La Crosse, WI, June 11-13?

The La Crosse area is a motorcyclist's playground. While other portions of the continent were scrubbed by glaciers during the last Ice Age, La Crosse and its environs escaped the frozen onslaught. As a result, the area boasts a picturesque landscape rife with natural features - a composition of bluffs, waterways, hills, and valleys.

In the 17th century, French traders explored the area and bolstered the town's development into the 18th century. In fact, they provided La Crosse its moniker, naming it for the curved stick used in an Indian game similar to modern-day lacrosse.

By the mid-19th century, Nathan Myrick, a young New Yorker, established a trading post on a river island, moving shortly thereafter to the mainland, where he mapped out the future town. As steamboat traffic increased, more folks began to settle, finding merit in the area's fertile soils and in trade opportunities afforded by land, rail, and water. Lumber was also profitable, as was beer-making (La Crosse was surpassed at one time only by Milwaukee in its output).


These days, the city is an inviting locale, prized for its natural beauty and comfortable ambiance. Recreation abounds, and the presence of the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse showcases culture and education. In addition, La Crosse takes great pride in preserving its historic structures and has revitalized its downtown commercial district with thoughtful renovations that highlight the city's architecture. Local museums, gracious paddle wheeler cruises, views from lofty Grandad Bluff, the pedestrian-friendly river walk at Riverside Park, and the shops of Old Towne North provide a measure of local color and an amiable introduction to La Crosse that can't be beat.

La Crosse, WI; county seat, river town, university city - it's all these and more, an admirable feat for a friendly town whose population proper just breaks 50,000.

## Summer MWRC

(Info regarding St. Joseph, MO obtained from wikipedia.org)

So Billings is too far and La Crosse isn't quite far enough for you, huh? Another option (which unfortunately coincides with our State Convention this year, June 11-13) is the 2010 Summer Midwest Regional Convention in St. Joseph, MO, hosted by the members of KC-Metro.

In recent years there has been an increasing amount of interaction between our chapter members and those in the MWRC, and many of us have found the MWRC events to be a great deal of fun.

St. Joseph, by Joseph local fur officially in 1843. In days, it was outpost and MO was founded Robidoux, a trader, and incorporated its early a bustling rough frontier

town, serving as a last supply point and jumping-off point over the Missouri River toward the "Wild West". This was due largely to the fact that it was the westernmost point in the United States accessible by rail until after the American Civil War.

Several events of particular historical note occurred in St. Joseph. Between April 3, 1860, and late October 1861, St. Joseph was one of the two endpoints of the Pony Express. In 1882, also on April 3, the notorious Jesse James was killed at his home, originally located at 1318 Lafayette, now sited next to The Patee House, a hotel that had formerly served as the home of both Patee Female College and St. Joseph Female College. James was living under the alias of Mr. Howard. An excerpt from a popular poem of the time is: "...that dirty little coward that shot Mr. Howard has laid poor Jesse in his grave." The predecessors of the Heaton-Bowman-Smith Funeral Home conducted the funeral for Jesse James and the current proprietors maintain a small museum which is open to the public. James' home, which has been relocated at least three times, is now maintained as a tourist attraction that features the bullet hole from that fateful shot. These two events lend St. Joseph the slogan, "Where the Pony Express started and Jesse James ended."

St. Joseph peaked as an expansionist city in 1900, with a census population of 102,979. At the time, it was the home to one of the largest wholesale companies in the Midwest, the Nave & McCord Mercantile Company, as well as the Hannibal & St. Joseph Railroad, and C.D. Smith & Company, which would become C.D. Smith Healthcare.

In 1997, St. Joseph was named an "All-America City" by the National Civic League. St. Joseph was voted the top true western town of 2007 by the True West Magazine, in the January/February 2008 issue. St. Joseph is also the home of Rosecrans Memorial Airport and 139th Airlift wing of the Missouri National Guard.

Your hosts, the KC-Metro chapter, has put together a fun-filled weekend and the event will feature;

- Daily breakfast (Fri, Sat & Sun)
- Friday burger & hot dog dinner
- Refreshments & snacks in a non-smoking hospitality room
- Friday night "No Limit" Texas Hold 'em Poker Tourney (Prizes for 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup>)
- Saturday lunch at Terrible's Casino
- Saturday banquet, awards ceremony, dancing and more

At a distance of only 550 miles from Milwaukee to St. Joseph, MO, why not plan a trip to our neighboring conference this year? Registration is just \$65 and includes a free event T-shirt if postmarked by March 15<sup>th</sup>. The host hotel is a Ramada Inn Property and the Blue Knight room rate is \$70/night.
